Where Are They Now?

Sylvia Johnson: An Experienced Habitat Owner by Elizabeth von Klemperer

Sylvia and Ernest Johnson live in a Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity house on Forbes Avenue in Northampton. Sylvia's life includes several moves and she looks back on them happily--as she does on life in general, including the people who have filled it and the things on which she has worked.

Sylvia is what some of us call "a people person," but really, she is also an artist, sensitive to the shapes, colors and sounds that she sees and creates—and to all the people in her life. Her positive view of life is evident in her behavior: her black eyes sparkle, her frame is small but lively. She is so eager to talk about the things she loves that the words tumble out.

Sylvia spent her early years in a house in Philadelphia. Her family was musical and liked to sing together, but her mother was determined that she learn to play "a real instrument," so she took piano lessons.

Music filled the apartment in New York City where she

moved with her husband and their three kids and spent the next part of her life. Visitors filled the apartment along with music-the more the better. In 1986 they started to take in nephews. They liked visitors to stay—and in fact some did stay pretty long: a brother-in-law came for a weekend and stayed for 27 weeks. Today Sylvia figures that she raised 8 children: three from her and her husband and one from her husband.

What about household chores in a group as fluid as that? According to Sylvia, "everybody did everything." This was in keeping with the Johnsons' present housekeeping in their Habitat

house: there is no division of labor, no man's work or woman's work. The Johnsons welcome manual work, handling wood or plaster or paint. Since moving to Massachusetts they discovered a new area of pleasure--gardening, for which they had no space in the city.

The Johnsons' motto is "always help people... Always help people with their dreams."

What was it like feeding all those young and old who dropped by or stayed a while? There was always food, says Sylvia; they always prepared more than enough. Now that they live in the country they find new ways to share. Sylvia creates new flavors from her herb garden and exchanges seedlings with her neighbors. For Sylvia, feeding the body goes with feeding the soul.

Her husband, she says, "is a very spiritual person." So, it seems, is she. She has always been interested in religion: she once wanted to be like John the Baptist. She feels that her becoming a Habitat family was divinely ordained and that God has been present in the work she has done on her house.

Sylvia appreciates Shakespeare's words, "If music be the food of love..." For years she and her husband have reached out to others through their music: they played in churches, at parties, at weddings. In recent years Silvia has been increasingly attracted to visual arts. She spent a year in art school. She draws, paints, sews, sculpts, and her works bring in money. What does she do about marketing? The word puzzles her. People like her work, she says; when they see a special doll, for example, they ask "May I buy it?"

The Johnsons' motto is "always help people." This could mean many things, but Sylvia likes to add her focus: "Always help people with their dreams."
